## STARTING THE DISCUSSION...

Politics has long been a topic that should never be discussed in polite company. It has enflamed many debates and family meals and lead to hurt feelings and disunity. Part of the reason that these discussions can become so heated is that political opinions and ideologies are often based on deeper convictions. And for Christians those are convictions that should be shaped and formed by the Word of God. Shaped by our understanding of the gospel! And the Bible calls us to do so and work for the good of those around us. Yet that doesn't mean that we expect that everyone, Christian or not, will agree with our understanding or where we land on a political spectrum. More than the debate, as Christians we ought to be longing for people to have a heart change, not a political change. Our goal is followers of Jesus, not political conversions. And that goal ought to shape how we speak about politics to those around us and how we engage in with our city and country.

# **KEY TEXT: JEREMIAH 29:4-7**

<sup>4</sup> "Thus says the LORD of hosts, the God of Israel, to all the exiles whom I have sent into exile from Jerusalem to Babylon: <sup>5</sup> Build houses and live in them; plant gardens and eat their produce. <sup>6</sup> Take wives and have sons and daughters; take wives for your sons, and give your daughters in marriage, that they may bear sons and daughters; multiply there, and do not decrease. <sup>7</sup> But seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the LORD on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.
